




The number of boys who took part in the survey, is bigger than that of girls.






The significant majority of students seems to have two employed parents, while a smaller number of them only have one unemployed parent. The amount of students with two unemployed parents is the least.






Most parents have either graduated high school, or obtained a university degree.






Almost every student lives in a city.






The majority of students appear to be satisfied by the area they live in.






The quality of students' houses seem to be in good condition or comfortable.






Only a small minority of students have declared to never feel happy at school.






No student feels that they are not liked by their counterparts.






It appears that the parents' profession is not a cause of discrimination at school.






Most students have not had to work in order to help their family financially.






It seems that the condition of a students' residence is not a cause of discrimination a school.






Sometimes school grades can be a cause of discrimination, but it seems that this is not often the case.






According to the results of the survey, students with better grades are sometimes treated better than the rest.






However, it appears that students with worse grades are sometimes treated better as well.

FINAL CONCLUSIONS

After carrying out this survey concerning social exclusion and studying meticulously its results, a few conclusions have been made. The answers of all teenagers that aged from 15 to 18 years old, show that students whose parent/s are employed, and who are raised in an appropriate environment and a friendly home, are more likely to be happy at school. This conclusion is attributed to the fact that these students are less likely to exclude someone, or be excluded by their fellow classmates, as they do not believe that a parent's job or a student's house are valid reasons for discrimination. School grades can sometimes be an area of discrimination, but the opinions differ. Some think, that good students are treated better by their counterparts, while others support the exact opposite. Finally, it appears that some reasons that may lead to social exclusion are distance, different interests and fear that they are not liked by their classmates.
